"NOTABLE MARGATIANS" – WINTER 2012/2013 LEIGH TURNER

It is with great pleasure we introduce you to one of our area's most devoted and dynamic professionals, Ms. Leigh Turner. Ms. Turner is a lifelong resident of Margate, a graduate of Atlantic City High School and the Richard Stockton College of New Jersey.

As the Community Initiative Coordinator for Jewish Family Service of Atlantic & Cape May Counties, Leigh Turner is one of this region's best known leaders in the volunteer community.

Turner manages more than 250 volunteers annually ranging in age from 5 to 95 years old. She oversees volunteer projects from Food Drives to Friendly Visitor, Shopping Programs for Seniors, Toy

Collections and Meals on Wheels. Whether coordinating donations of 300 Thanksgiving Meals or gathering 100 House Tour volunteers, her commitment to our community speaks volumes to her outstanding character and ethic.

Recently, Leigh added a new role to her already busy schedule. When Hurricane Sandy hit our community, Leigh jumped into action. Organized by Turner, the Jewish Family Service Food Pantry opened two days after the storm when many were stuck on the island with little food options. As the needs and donations continued to grow, JFS obtained permission to expand their distribution to include cleaning supplies, toiletries blankets, and other necessities many lost as a result of the storm. In early November, the JFS Distribution Center opened at St. James Church in Ventnor to meet the needs of those whose lives were affected by Sandy. To date, more than 2,500 individuals and families have been helped through the JFS Distribution Center and Leigh added a new expanded her responsibilities at Jewish Family Service to include her position as "Community Coordinator for Sandy Relief."

With her added responsibilities, Ms. Turner has worked with various agencies to educate herself on the policies and procedures related to Hurricane Disaster. She has become a respected professional on disaster relief and has worked endlessly to ensure the needs of our community are being met.

Among her other community leadership roles, Leigh is Past President of the Home & School Association of Margate, served on the Executive Board of The Holocaust Resource Center at Richard Stockton College of New Jersey and is on the Executive Board of Our Children making Change. In 2009, she was selected as a recipient of the area's "Top 40 Under 40" honoree. Other accolades include a Tribute presented in her honor from the Atlantic County Board of Rabbis for her Excellence in serving the community. She was also recognized by her fellow employees in 2008 with the JFS "Heart and Soul" award for her quiet commitment to furthering Agency goals and mission.

The compelling ways in which Leigh Turner "Makes It All Happen" is critical toward the Agency's work has earned the long standing respect of her peers and the community.

ZONING TIDBITS By ROGER RUBIN, ZONING OFFICER

On behalf of the Zoning Department and the Construction Office, we are making every effort to assist all of you with storm and flood repair assistance and approvals. Our boss, Mayor Mike Becker, has instructed us to provide speedy results, clear explanations, to the extent possible, and to respond to you without delay, and we are truly endeavoring to do so.

To that end, please keep this information handy:

Construction Office 101 N. Washington Avenue 609-822-1974 Hours: 7:30A.M. to 4:00P.M. Monday-Friday

The Construction Office is directed by James Galantino. Permit fees will continue to be waived to assist you in keeping costs down. Call to find out what kind of work needs permits, and how to properly install dumpsters and pods, as well as any other questions. If you are thinking about raising your house up to FEMA flood level (11 feet above sea level) do not hesitate to call Mr. Galantino for information.

The Zoning Officer is Roger Rubin, who may be reached at 609-822-5438 and is located in the Union Avenue School building at 9001 Winchester Avenue. Many repair building permits do not need zoning approvals, but when they do we will get them done quickly so you can get the building permit without loss of significant time.

In addition, the City Commissioners have passed a new ordinance (N0. 20 of 2012), which says essentially: If your house was partially or totally destroyed by a storm or flood occurring after a declared state of emergency (as Sandy was) you can rebuild that exact house, at flood level, even if it has zoning non-conformities. If this is a possibility for you, call immediately at 822-5438 to learn how to go about it.

The Commissioners are presently considering another important ordinance, which will likely be finalized by December 20: If you want to raise your single-family house or duplex to flood elevation, you can do so without Planning Board action even if there are non-conformities, and you can raise it as high as two feet above flood elevation (meaning up to elevation 13 above sea level).

FINALLY, THE CITY'S PLANNING BOARD WILL BE REVISING FIRST FLOOR ELEVATION REQUIREMENTS FOR NEW CONSTRUCTION AND THE RAISING OF EXISTING HOUSES, TO COMPLY WITH THE NEW FEMA REQUIREMENTS PROMULGATED @ DECEMBER 18. THIS WILL INCLUDE A PUBLIC HEARING AND SHOULD BE COMPLETED, BY AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION AS QUICKLY AS THE LAW WILL PERMIT, WITH A TARGET OF MID FEBRUARY. PLEASE CONSIDER POSSIBLE SELF-IMPOSED DELAYS IN YOUR CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS TO ASSURE YOU WILL BE IN COMPLIANCE.

Again, call if this might be helpful to you.

We wish you all well in these difficult times for many of us. We are here to simplify and expedite your remediation to the extent allowed by law. Please be in touch and let us help you.

FLOOD SAFETY INFORMATION

Your homeowner's insurance policy does NOT cover losses due to flooding! Margate City has participated in the National Flood Insurance Program since its inception and flood insurance is available for almost any enclosed building and its contents. Maximum insurance on a one family dwelling is \$250,000 and \$100,000 on household contents. Nonresidential and business properties are also eligible for insurance in various amounts. Flood insurance is mandatory for all federally related financial assistance for loans to purchase, construct, repair or improve any building in the Special Flood Hazard Area and all lending agencies, real estate offices and title companies are aware of this Federal requirement. Reduced rates are available depending on your lowest floor elevation above mean sea level plus a variety of deductible amounts. We urge you to inquire about flood insurance coverage from your insurance agent for further information regarding this most important part of your insurance coverage.
